A couple of announcements about the financial report: 1) There is a donation from activities that is half of the money made from the Fourth of July picnic; 2) Check #1467 was written last month without an amount, in anticipation of an Office Max bill which did not come. Therefore, the check is still outstanding. I expect to be able to send it this month and it will be recorded next month. 3) I have added a line to show the Literature bank balance, as I now have access to that information.

Finally, I participated in a physical inventory of the Literature room as part of the audit of the Literature subcommittee as required by the Bylaws.

Hello and welcome to all. I would like to thank the members, GSR's, and subcommittee Chairpersons for attending and participating in the ASC meeting.

I would however like to take a moment to suggest that if you are a GSR and you have not read the Guide to Local Service, that you do so. It also informs us of groups that are doing well, and helps us to see a clear picture of the status of our area's groups. I have received emails and telephone calls from members who are concerned or confused about some issues relating to business conducted here. I highly encourage the GSR's to be attentive during the meeting and to be very accurate in the information that you relay to your home groups. If there are members within your home group that have an issue, invite them to the ASC meeting. Remember that any member of Narcotics Anonymous can make a motion here, and that the final authority rests with the groups. However, if the members of a group are not clear on an issue a lot of problems can arise. In an effort to reduce the impact of these problems, I suggest that we encourage people who have concerns to attend the ASC meetings. If anyone needs help in writing a motion that is clear, concise, and does not contradict our guiding principles, or you would just like to get some outside input feel free to approach any of the BOD members and we will help in any way we can.

Good afternoon area. This has been a busy month for me. I usually have nothing to report. So hold on. This month I "temporarily" took over as are webhost due to the resignation of our webhost. I have completed an audit of our website and have done some housecleaning to remove much spam, and make it more secure by locking down accounts and making sure that it is secure.

I attended the PR, Literature, Outreach and Activities subcommittee meetings at the request of the subcommittees. PR / Phone line are running well, I am assisting as webhost until we can find someone with the skills and willingness to take over. I assisted the Outreach chair in reviewing and ensuring that their guidelines have clear responsibilities and guidelines that they can be measured.

The activities subcommittee is doing their best and my recommendations to them would be 1) to follow the guidelines and procedures that they have adopted. That subcommittee is large and, it is difficult with that many people to maintain without a clear set of procedures that people are help accountable to follow. ### **Oregon Regional NA Quarterly meeting report – James M**

**I. Reports:**

**a. Chair:**

- i. Holly contacted California Dept. of Corrections about a fire camp on the California side of Oregon border that does not have access to H&I meetings. She spoke with the H&I subcommittee for that Area and was told that they do not provide service in that local. Together they discussed the option of having one of our Area H&I subcommittees providing meetings to that facility.
- ii. There will be a Learning days on April 17<sup>th</sup> (weekend of regional service) at Siletz tribal grounds in Linn-Benton area. The grounds are available

unless the tribe has a death and needs the ceremonial grounds. Two workshops, a mock 12 step panel and sponsorship behind the walls.

- b. Vice Chair: Patrick reported he would like to help the Areas serving Coffee Creek and requested that the three Areas contact him. In addition, Regional H&I requested that Portland, Mid-Willamette and Greater-Willamette meet together to better coordinate H&I at Coffee Creek.
- c. Regions:
  - i. Coos Bay: Have been going into Shutter Creek general population twice a month and met with facility to start taking H&I to Boot Camp twice a month. They are also trying to get back into the county jail.
  - ii. Rogue Redwood: H&I now joined with PR. They serve Josephine Co. Jail and need members with clearance to serve facility. H&I attendance is down.
  - iii. Lane County: Men's jail panel chair stepped down and has not been replaced. Chair LeeAnn is trying to get men with badges to turn them in so new men can sign up.
  - iv. Greater Willamette: H&I and PR joined and continue to contact facilities. They provide meeting schedules to Veterans Administration, Clackamas parole/probation, Clackamas Co. Health. They want to work with other areas to serve Clackamas Co. jail and Coffee Creek.
  - v. North Coast: Going into Tillamook Co. jail men and women's side.
  - vi. Umpqua Valley: Working with PR and focusing on serving facilities that can't get to outside meetings. Douglas Co. Jail cancelled H&I due to budget cuts.
- II. Elections were held: Charles from Redwood was nominated and elected as Vice Chair. Robin from Mid-Willamette was nominated and elected as secretary.
- III. Announcements:
  - a. Patrick: we should look at how to train replacements and recruit for H&I positions at the learning days. It might also be a good idea to meet via phone or email in between region to work out any kinks.
  - b. Walt: There are North Coast H&I members who can get clearance and would like to come to Portland for commitments.
  - c. There was an incident at Josephine Co. jail when 3 women went into the facility and had a lighter and coins in their pockets which are contraband. When they were patted down and caught with the contraband they apparently were rude to the officer. A discussion followed about members responsibilities and following the rules of the facility and behaviors during commitments.

### **IV. Public Relations: Vera K**

We have had another relatively busy month in Public Relations. Maggi and I met with the PR chair (Nathan) from TVA about shared services with the schedule. We outlined some ideas about how we would make shared services work between the 3 areas. The ideas include: Rotation of the schedule between the 3 areas, adding their subcommittee information, having quarterly meetings, agreements about major changes to the schedule with advanced notice, our guidelines reflecting the same information for each area, and a back-up system. There have been no decisions made at this time all we are doing is discussing the possibilities. TVA and GWVA and Portland have been participating in shared services all along in regards to the schedule and will continue to do so if there is a Metro or not. What our 3 areas are doing is talking about making it more official if the Metro is to disband. TVA has presented a motion in their area that is going back to the groups on whether TVA should disband from the Metro and we will know the results in November of that decision. In the meantime the tri-area's goals are to have one schedule between the areas to lessen outside confusion and to promote unity between the tri-areas.

We are continuing to work on getting ad placements in local papers. Which include: The Oregonian, The Mercury, The Willamette Week, and Street Roots etc.... For those who may be concerned about Attraction rather than Promotion. Please let me assure you that we are strictly following the 11th Tradition and fulfilling our Public Relations duties and being trusted servants to this body. We know that these types of ad placements haven't been done for awhile in Portland and this may seem confusing to people so we encourage anyone to come to the Public Relations committee to discuss this policy or to call me personally if you have any questions. **It works how and why the 11th Tradition pg.207** *"To be of maximum service to the still-suffering addict, we must energetically seek to carry our message throughout our cities, towns, and villages. Our public relations policy is based on attraction, to be sure, not promotion. But to attract the still-suffering addict to our program, we must take vigorous steps to make our program widely known. The better and broader our public relations, the better we will be able to serve."*

Our web host resigned earlier this month. Mike R. has kindly stepped in to perform the duties of the web host on a temporary basis. Public Relations is very grateful for Mike R. and we are on a mad search for a replacement web host. Thanks Mike! Please bring back to your groups that we are in need of a web host the qualifications are: Webmaster experience and HTML.

Our Flyer coordinator resigned as well - her life became too busy for her to be able to perform the duties of Flyer coordinator. At our Public Relations meeting Wes S. stepped up to fill the position and we are in the process of training. Thanks Wes!

We had our first PR guidelines meeting on Sunday October 11th and it was well attended. We were able to get through about a page and a half. Our next meeting is set for November 8th at noon at the Holgate library. Nate and Maggi are working together on making the changes to the document.

Watershed Treatment center called me about three weeks ago and stated that they removed their listing from the Portland Dex and emailed me confirmation. I also received confirmation from Dex about our listing in the new Dex which will be coming out at the end of the year. Watershed will be an ongoing issue and our phone books will need to be checked yearly until they stop using the Narcotics Anonymous name.

Maggi attended the Regional this month and reported that there will be a Learning Day in April 2010 in Siletz. Part of the Learning Day is to share information from the Western States Learning days. Maggi brought back to the PR committee a list of topics that we are interested in to bring back to Rusty and Ross who will be attending the (WSLD) Western States Learning Days. There will be more information to come in the coming months with Maggi's RCM report. PR is working closely with Phoneline. David and I are looking into options for our Portland Area Phoneline service. We are reevaluating the usefulness of our current system. We are looking into other companies that would better suit our needs. We are looking into the amount of calls that come in each month. So far we haven't noticed an increase but we expect the total number of calls to rise as the local phoneline number is being placed in several locations. We are also making attempts at communication with TVA and GWVA to discuss the shared services that we already have in place with them as well to improve communication and unity between the 3 areas. Phoneline has their first guidelines meeting set up for November 15th before the Phoneline meeting.

Everything with the schedule is going well just a few adjustments here and there.

I'm continuing to work with subcommittees in our area to improve communication and unity as well as working with other subcommittees in the tri-areas. I'm very pleased to say that PR is growing strong with new members joining each month and looking forward to filling more positions on the committee.

#### **V. Literature: Carolyn**

It has been a busy month and I would like to thank all of you for your understanding and extending extra time to me to get all my reports in order. I'm working hard to fulfill these

commitments. First, we completed a hand count of the entire Literature inventory. Second, we have restructured our computer program and are no longer using quick books. We now have a spread sheet that we are using and we are hoping this will help us to stay current.

We had to close our bank account at Wells Fargo due to fraud issues but have opened a new one. A substantial amount of money was taken from account, likely in May or June, through electronic fraud perpetrated by someone outside the state of Oregon. The funds were replaced and a new account was set up. However, this messed up the finances and we are still working on reconciling the financial records. Hopefully, this will be completed by next month. In addition, our treasurer, Jeff, has resigned from the committee due to school commitments and I still need to meet with him to review some of the previous month's financial documents.

We have created new order forms to accommodate more items and correct prices. If you have old forms you should discard them. We have provided 300 copies for today and they will be available on line by Monday October 26<sup>th</sup>. The order forms have 2 quantity columns, one for items in Spanish and one for items in English. This allowed us to add more items but continue to only use one sheet of paper. The prices of the items in the Starter Kits were reduced so in order to keep the kit price at \$20 we added another white book and the treasures pad to the kit.

#### **VI. Outreach: Jeff W**

Both Zak and Troy were absent for the subcommittee meeting due to illness and surgery. Meeting updates: Tuesday Night Freedom Fighters has changed their meeting time to 6:30pm but is still on the same night and meets for one hour. The attendance at Clean Freaks has picked up.

The issue of money being taken from Outreach has been resolved. Vera K requested that all external emails (i.e. from businesses, treatment centers, etc.) be forwarded to her. Revising the Outreach section (describing the specific duties of outreach) of the Guide to Local Service was tabled pending the receipt of the revised By-Laws. By-Laws will be revised and presented to Outreach by Mike R. who was not present at this month's subcommittee meeting.

Three new GSRs attended orientation and orientation was successfully performed by Jeff W due to the absence of Bryan E. Kudos given to Michael McD, B.A., and Vera K for providing experience, strength and hope for orientation.

#### **Break**

Meeting reopened with a moment of silence at 3:01pm.

**RCM Report: Michael McD**

Good Afternoon, It is great to be here with you on a gorgeous sunny day. I hope all of you are enjoying all that our recovery can bring us. I have only a few things to discuss today so hopefully this will be brief.

1. Activities: I have not been able to attend the Activities meeting and I apologize to you and to Gene. It seems that meeting time is a bit more challenging than I had hoped it would be. I will meet with Gene and discuss this situation.
2. Regional Service Conference: I attended the RSC in Rogue River last weekend. I received the seed money for the regional CAR Assembly to be held the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> of February in Portland. We have identified several venues but so far do not have what we want. If anyone knows of a facility that can hold up to 100 people and has a simple kitchen, it would be greatly appreciated if you can pass that information on to Steve R, Vera K, or me. The plan is to have a Saturday workshop about the Conference Agenda Report from approximately 9 to 5 PM then a break for dinner, followed by a speaker meeting and a coffeehouse with coffee snacks and live music. The workshop will continue on Sunday. We will need help as this gets closer and I hope we can count on you to assist and attend. It has been quite awhile since Portland has hosted a regional event and this is an opportunity for our members to meet new people from different areas around our region learn what is going on in NA around the world and have some great fellowship.

As I mentioned last month, there are several positions at region that are not filled. We need an Alt Secretary, an Alt treasurer, an Activities Chair, and an Archivist. We removed the Additional Committee from the By Laws since there had not been an Additional Needs Committee for many years.

3. And now for Metro. If you read your minutes, you saw that there was an addendum from the TVA Metro Committee Member giving the TVA position on what happened at the Metro meeting last month. Basically TVA is in the process of a group vote on whether or not they want to be involved in the Metro. Until that vote is cast on November 1<sup>st</sup> they have no official position on leaving the Rose City Metro or continuing on as members of that body. More will be revealed. I met with the TVA RCM at region and had a long personal discussion about what had occurred at the Metro Meeting and where he thought TVA might end up. We have made it very clear to all involved that we would support a shared serve effort to produce an accurate tri area schedule as well as be open to a Tri Area Phonenumber service with possibly an 800 number, to allow people from all three areas to call an NA Phonenumber without toll charges. I plan on attending the TVA ASC meeting on November 1<sup>st</sup> to observe their ASC meeting.

I would like to bring up the issue of group donations. For the last few months donations have not met expenses. I know that this is in Maggi's Treasurers report but not discussed. The area needs funds to continue the work that the groups have approved. If we do not find a way to grow the donations from our groups, something will have to give. None of us likes to even think about cutting back on the services that we provide the area and the community; however we will have to cut services or receive more donations. I strongly believe that the 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition should fund our service efforts and that to rely on functions and fundraisers is a dangerous precedent. The groups can take responsibility for and get accountability from a service structure that relies on them for the majority of its funding. Group funding of the service structure will build a much better and more responsive service structure, one that carries out the direction that the groups have set. This is really part of the planning process and the first step in that was taking our inventory. At some point, we need to begin to plan the work ahead and have the groups, through their GSR's, as part of that planning and work.

**Insurance Ad Hoc committee:**

We have quotes from 5 insurance companies, two that were brought to Area previously and three more that were received yesterday. The committee has not had a chance to review all the quotes, much less discuss them and come up with a recommendation. It's not a matter of just picking the lowest price, as the agent only presented the quotes that had the best price for the coverage. For each quote the coverage is different, so it's like comparing orange peels to apple sauce. As we do not have our information in a form to present to Area that will enable you to make an informed decision, we request another extension until November's PASC.

**Open Forum**

Southeast Serenity: Feels that the decision by PR to place ads in local papers was out of order and that the subcommittee should have brought this idea before the body to be voted on by the groups.

The guiding principles of NA and service have not been violated so there really isn't anything that this body can do. If, one chooses, a motion can be made stating that the decision to place ads in
